Her congregation has been in Thailand for 120 years and has 22 schools for students from kindergarten to high school. In 2013, they formed Talitha Kum Thailand to

combat trafficking.

In immigration news: The U.S. government <u>must account for family members</u> separated at border (which started in the summer of 2017) by October.

The chairmen of two U.S. bishops' committees said July 3 they <u>oppose a proposed</u> <u>rule by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development</u> that they say would lead to separation or housing instability for many families.
