Donna L. Ciangio, United States

Donna L. Ciangio is a Sister of St. Dominic of Caldwell, New Jersey. With an academic background in fine arts, religious studies, education and ministry, she has been the director (U.S. and international) of Renew International and the director of pastoral services for the National Pastoral Life Center. She has worked extensively in church leadership consultation. Most recently, she has been a university adjunct professor and the chancellor of the Archdiocese of Newark. 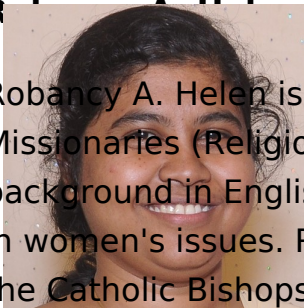
Nasreen Daniel, Pakistan

She is currently working on doctoral studies and training Catholic youth in leadership and social issues.

She is a human rights activist, a freelance journalist and an advocate with a special interest for the cause of the poor, Dalits, tribal women, children, minorities and migrants. Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, she has been actively involved in the safe return of the migrants and continues to work for their rights through advocacy and lobbying through networking with government administrations and civil society groups. Presently, she is working as the deputy director of the Excellent IAS Academy in Bhubaneswar, Eastern Indian State of Odisha. She is the coordinator of the social projects of the congregation.

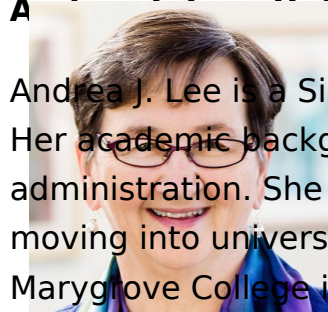


Kathryn Keigher, England

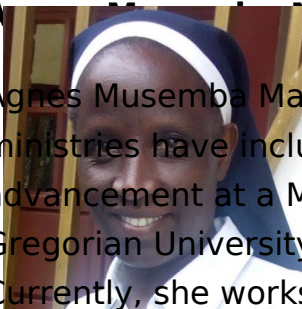
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Rita Malavisi, Australia

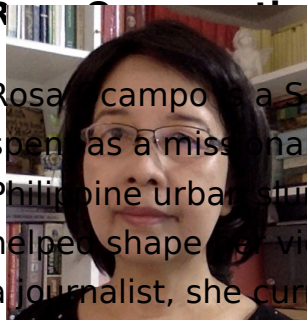

Margaret Grace Nakafu, Uganda / Honduras



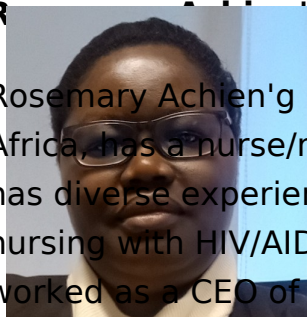

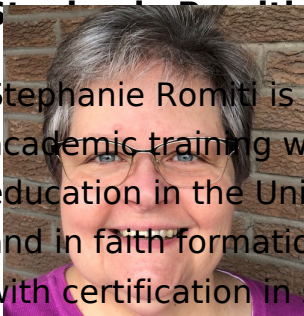
Kathryn Press, United States / Ireland

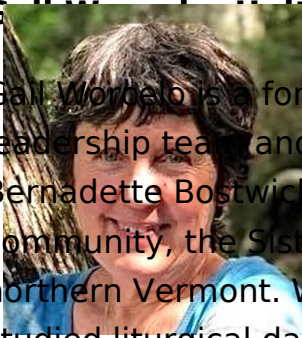




Susan Elizabeth Smith, New Zealand
