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Little did I know that when <u>Basilian</u> Sr. Monica Jaciuk came from Argentina in 2003 to minister in our province in Philadelphia, she would become a close friend, colleague, collaborator and partner in many of our projects and ministries.

She received permission from her provincial to come to the States to see how the USA handles communication in various media, her field of study. Knowing only Spanish and Ukrainian, she was assigned to work at our archeparchial newspaper, The Way, where the staff knew Ukrainian. There, she began learning English informally.

After a year of working at the newspaper, she asked to be assigned to our Pastoral Ministry Office in Pittsburgh, since she had heard of our first production of "New Life in the Trinity: The Mystery of Christian Initiation" (a video on the sacraments of baptism, chrismation and Eucharist) and she was interested in doing videos. That's when our collaboration began.

Since she wanted to expand her knowledge of videos, I introduced her to our local broadcasting channel, PCTV, where we had done our first nonprofessional video, "Being Born Again."

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She spent hours producing small vignettes and we even collaborated on an icon series called "Kairos." Eastern Christian theology and spirituality were not her forte, but it was mine and she absorbed much through our joint prayer, discussions and even courses at St. Cyril and Methodius Seminary in Pittsburgh.

Her help in getting appropriate photos for all the following professional videos that I produced were a wonderful creative contribution. She also inspired me to have subtitles in all our videos in different languages so that she could teach her people back in Argentina.

It was a joy and a challenge to keep up with all her creative ideas. Her love for Eastern Christian theology was enormous. She collaborated with me as a translator and photographer on all the following videos: "The Kiss of Christ: The Mystery of Repentance," "Sacrifice of Praise: An Exploration of the Divine Liturgy" and "Oil of Gladness: The Mystery of Anointing of the Sick."


